

EMERGENCY RESPONSE DRIVING FIRE STANDARD REVIEW

The below table shows the original ERD Fire Standard which was published in 2021 in the left column. The right column shows the proposed changes to the ERD Fire Standard as a result of the workshop held with ERD practitioners in March 2025. Notable changes have been highlighted in red. Minor changes where text may have been moved have not been highlighted.

Desired Outcome		
For all employees who drive using blue lights and claim any legal exemptions for a fire and rescue service purpose, to have been trained in a consistent way so that they drive safely, in line with the requirements of their role and in accordance with relevant legislation.		A fire and rescue service that has the trust of the community in keeping them, and its employees safe because of its competent drivers. It is a service where drivers have been taught to drive safely by suitably trained and qualified instructors and assessors, in line with the requirements of their roles, and in accordance with the relevant legislation and regulations. It is a service which gives due regard to relevant national guidance.
For all response driver training instructors and assessors to be qualified in accordance with the relevant legislation.		A service that has a learning culture which considers the value of internal and external feedback, inspection outcomes, internal and external assurance activities. It reviews and regularly evaluates what it does to provide a better service to the public, while identifying and managing organisational risk.

What is required to meet the Fire Standard

A fire and rescue service **must**:

1. Comply with legislation and guidance that applies to emergency response driving
2. Adopt and align their emergency response driver training to the NFCC Emergency Response Driver and Instructor Framework
3. Adopt and align their emergency response driver instructor training to the NFCC Emergency Response Driver and Instructor Framework
4. Ensure that records of driver competency and refresher training are kept and maintained
5. Ensure that their driver training provision is periodically independently quality assured

A fire and rescue service **should**:

6. Ensure that both managers who are responsible for emergency response driving and those working as driving instructors, contribute to the continual improvement of driver training standards by communicating, sharing learning and experiences with the NFCC network of fire and rescue service driving instructors and centres through:

A fire and rescue service **must**:

1. Have a strategic approach to ensure that it can continue to deliver an emergency response in line with the risks outlined in its Community Risk Management Plan
2. Comply with legislation and regulations and give due regard to relevant national guidance including the NFCC Emergency Response Driver and Instructor Framework
3. Ensure that records of driver competency and **revalidation** training are kept and maintained
4. Ensure that their driver training provision is periodically independently quality assured
5. Deliver inclusive and accessible training, recognising that every workforce, community and group has different and diverse needs
6. Support the national Driver Training Advisory Group (DTAG) through regional structures
7. Provide appropriate representation at relevant national meetings, events and conferences
8. Ensure that both managers who are responsible for emergency response driving and those working as driving instructors, contribute to the continual improvement of driver training standards. They do this by communicating and sharing learning and
