Desired Outcome

A fire and rescue service that has a clear understanding of how to deliver effective, efficient and impactful prevention. It can explain how it manages its prevention activities to improve the safety, health and wellbeing of its communities by reducing risk identified in its Community Risk Management Planning (CRMP).

A fire and rescue service delivering prevention:

- 1. Identifies and targets those who are most at risk in its community whilst demonstrating inclusivity, equality of access and is non discriminatory
- 2. Adopts a person-centred approach that places the individual and the communities it serves at the core of its prevention activity
- 3. Utilises and shares accurate data and learning (internal and external sources) to target evidence-based activity
- 4. Demonstrates a culture where it works collaboratively with other stakeholders and partners to be innovative and maximise resources
- 5. Demonstrates proactive prevention planning and implementation which responds and adapts to the changing needs of its community
- 6. Works with all relevant stakeholders to support and promote the prevention of fire, road and water incidents
- 7. Demonstrates how outcomes are measured, quality assured and evaluated to ensure the efficiency and effectiveness of prevention
- 8. Appropriately recruits, trains and develops competent staff and volunteers to support and deliver prevention activities

To achieve this Fire Standard

To achieve this Fire Standard, a fire and rescue service must:

- 1. Work collaboratively with relevant stakeholders and partners to plan and deliver prevention activity. This requires;
 - a) A named lead for prevention in the Fire and Rescue Service

- b) A Prevention Strategy and plan to deliver
- 2. Work in partnership to identify and target prevention to those most at risk in their community
- 3. Utilise and share accurate and timely data and intelligence to support evidence-based decision making and organisational learning
- 4. Make decisions on the deployment of resources for prevention in alignment with community risk, need, financial and physical resources
- 5. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of their community and manage prevention activities in accordance with the outcome and priorities of its community risk planning
- 6. Work with relevant partners to develop and deliver training on fire, water and road safety
- 7. Monitor and evaluate the effectiveness, efficiency and impact of the activity
- 8. Provide prevention and safeguarding training to relevant FRS staff to ensure a competent and professional workforce

Expected benefits of achieving the Fire Standard

- 1. Improved safety, health and wellbeing of communities
 - a. reduction in injuries, serious injuries and fatalities
 - b. reduction in economic loss to its communities
 - c. reduction in psychological impacts to its communities
- 2. Greater consistency in the use of data and intelligence will aid information sharing and better targeting of prevention activities
- 3. National consistency in the planning, collaboration and development of prevention
- 4. Improved trust in and reputation of the service
- 5. Improved professionalism and competence in the prevention workforce
- 6. Improved evaluation to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of prevention activities
